Friday 14 June 11:00-17:00	Symposium: Puerto Rico after Hurricane Maria: Culture, Politics, Place Hurricane Maria, a category-5 storm, made landfall in Puerto Rico on 20 September 2017, just two weeks after Hurricane Irma scraped past the north of the island, leaving a great majority of the population without power. Puerto Rico's 3.5 million inhabitants are still struggling to come to terms with the humanitarian crisis created by this event. Aside from an overwhelmed infrastructure, a growing health crisis, and a continuing exodus to the US, the island's power grid, which was frail before the event, is still inoperative, and it is unlikely that Puerto Ricans will be able to have electricity in their homes before the new year. It has been declared the longest blackout in US history. This symposium brings together a number of voices from Puerto Rico, who will address the situation in the island from political, infrastructural
	and cultural angles. The guest speakers are Eduardo Lalo (University of Puerto Rico), one of the island's most important writers; Antonio Carmona Báez (University of St. Maarten), an expert in matters of community activism, and Melissa Fernández Arrigoitia (Lancaster University), a sociologist who is an expert in urban crisis.
